CAMPUS LOCATION

You may find the Department of Statistics on the North end of campus in Weniger Hall (WNGR). Our main office and the majority of faculty and student offices are on floor 2. To get to WNGR and you can take the Beaver Bus (for free), which stops nearby, or you can drive and park on the nearby streets or a campus parking lot. Street parking and campus lots cost to park. There is only a small parking lot behind WNGR and a few nearby lots as well. Where you can park is based on the type of [parking permit you purchase](#). Parking can fill up quickly and passes can be expensive so it is best to try and walk, ride your bike, or use the FREE [Corvallis](#) & [OSU](#) bus systems.

Many of our TA offices are located in Kidder Hall (KIDD), which used to be home to the Department of Statistics. Kidder Hall is just across the street, to the SE of WNGR.

PROFESSIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

STATISTICS SEMINARS & TEAS

Once a week, the department hosts a seminar event and invites an expert in the field to visit us. Experts range from industry workers to academics, and often include program alumni or the past mentors of our own faculty. Students get a chance to know the speaker at the weekly Department Tea that occurs before the talk, and will often accompany that week's speaker to lunch. Seminars are streamed for those who cannot attend in person.

BROWN BAG LUNCH SERIES

We recently launched a new Brown Bag Lunch Series just for our students. Students are encouraged to meet for lunch and learn more about the field of statistics. Some weeks, the group reads articles or watches a documentary. Other weeks, workshops are hosted on topics such as building a portfolio and job searches.

ALUMNI MENTORING PROGRAM

The Alumni Mentoring Program is another new opportunity. First-year graduate students have the option to sign up and be matched with a program alumni. Typically, student-mentor pairs connect ~1 per term.

CONFERENCES

Students are highly encouraged to attend conferences and external workshops and we do our best to support student travel to these events. Every summer, a group of our students attends the Joint Statistical Math Meeting, the largest professional statistics event in North America.

SURVEY RESEARCH CENTER

The Department of Statistics is proud to offer statistical services to our OSU and greater community through our Survey Research Center (SRC). The SRC staff assist clients with comprehensive survey services, from proposal development, questionnaire design and layout, survey administration and data collection, to analysis and professional report writing.

STATISTICAL CONSULTING (ST 509)

Our department offers statistical consulting for students and faculty across campus. The statistical consulting team is made up of graduate students and a faculty mentor, who give advice on different aspects of statistical design and analysis such as study design, database management, data exploration, formulating a statistical model, determining analysis and statistical software, and analysis interpretation. All statistics students are required to complete a consulting practicum with the SRC after completing their method course sequence (ST 551, 552, & 553). During students' first year, they should register for the course Attendance at Consulting (1 credit; ST 507).

STUDENT TIPS FOR WORK-LIFE BALANCE

"Treat it [school] like a 9-5 job so that you can have the weekends to yourself.

Close the computer at midnight. Start the work as soon as you can. Don't leave it to the last minute. Grading can sometimes take much more time than expected."

"Adjusting to the quarter system was difficult for me, so making sure you don't overload on the course load (and extracurriculars) was something I learned last term. I think sometimes just knowing you tried your best is helpful, because these courses are difficult on top of the faster pace. Be friends with your peers, and try not to compare how you're doing to how someone else is doing because you're not the same person and presumably didn't have the same background."

STUDENT TIPS FOR SUCCEEDING IN THE STATISTICS PROGRAM

"I was able to attend the Comps review sessions over the summer which made a HUGE difference for passing comps,"

"Take the special topics courses when you can. They might not come around again,"

"Learn Latex within the first week of arriving (it's not hard). You'll want to use it for homework and reports. Learn Overleaf for reports."

"Trevor Basset has a great YouTube series for LaTeX."

"Join the ASA and sign up for their daily news letter. The emails contain a lot of useful resources and networking opportunities. Get involved with the local Oregon chapter when they host events,"

[picking a mentor] "All of the professors are friendly and chill. Wait a little bit before thinking about advisors and get comfortable at the institution before making a decision,"

- Treat the process like dating. It's not just about who has the biggest brain.
- You will be working with this person a lot, so make sure you vibe with them,"

"The Grad School Workshops have a lot of good lessons, I took an intro to GIS one and haven't finished it but it's nice to have that sort of exposure. They also offer lessons in LaTeX, R, and Github that may be good resources for the statistics classes,"

FAVORITE CLASSES

CS 513 APPLIED MACHINE LEARNING

Explores machine learning basics (variance and bias, underfitting and overfitting, etc). Reviews linear algebra and Numpy. Examines k-nearest neighbors, linear classification (perceptron and online learning), and linear and non-linear regression. Explores applications in housing price prediction (Kaggle contest) and text classification (sentiment analysis).

ST 543 APPLIED STOCHASTIC MODELS

Development of stochastic models commonly arising in statistics and operations research, such as Poisson processes, birth-and-death processes, discrete-time and continuous-time Markov chains, renewal and Markov renewal processes. Analysis of stochastic models by simulation and other computational techniques.

ST 551 STATISTICAL METHODS

Properties of t, chi-square and F tests; randomized experiments; sampling distributions and standard errors of estimators, delta method, comparison of several groups of measurements; two-way tables of measurements.

ST 562 & 661 THEORY OF STATISTICS

Sufficiency, exponential families, location and scale families; point estimation: maximum likelihood, Bayes, and unbiased estimators; asymptotic distributions of maximum likelihood estimators; Taylor series approximations.

(Adv theory) Exponential families, sufficient statistics; unbiased, equivariant, Bayes, and admissible estimation. Offered alternate years.

ST 567 SPATIAL STATISTICS

The analysis of spatial data. Graphical tools for exploring spatial data, geostatistics, variogram estimation, kriging, areal models, hierarchical spatial models, and spatio-temporal modelling. Offered winter term in odd years.

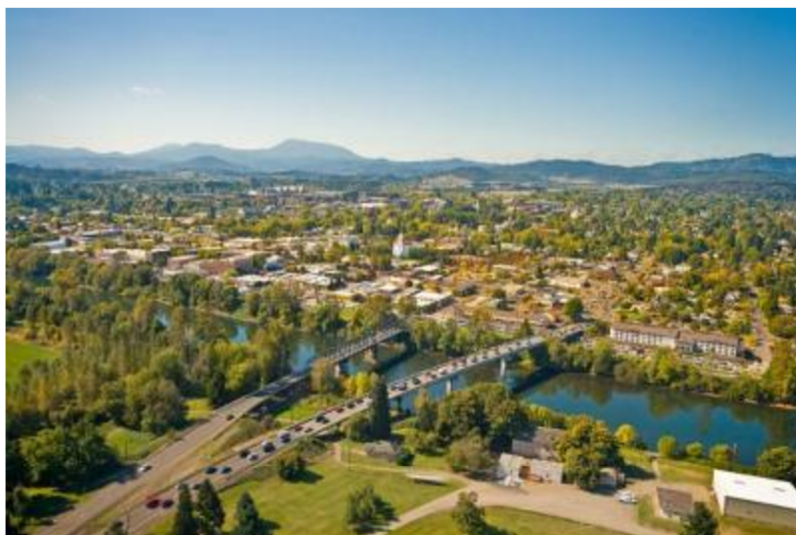
ST 623 GENERALIZED REGRESSION MODELS

Maximum likelihood analysis for frequency data; regression-type models for binomial and Poisson data; iterative weighted least squares and maximum likelihood; analysis of deviance and residuals; over-dispersion and quasilikelihood models; log-linear models for multidimensional contingency tables.

PNW WEATHER

The Pacific Northwest is known for being grey and rainy. However, it experiences all four seasons, all nice in their own way. Winters are typically mild with frequent rainfall and overcast skies, particularly from November through March. Snowfall is not uncommon but it is usually light and melts quick.

Spring brings a gradual transition to clearer skies and warmer temperatures, with vibrant foliage and flowers. Summers are generally sunny and pleasantly warm, making it an ideal season for outdoor activities. By fall, cooler temperatures return, along with increased precipitation and striking autumn colors. MANAGING WINTER

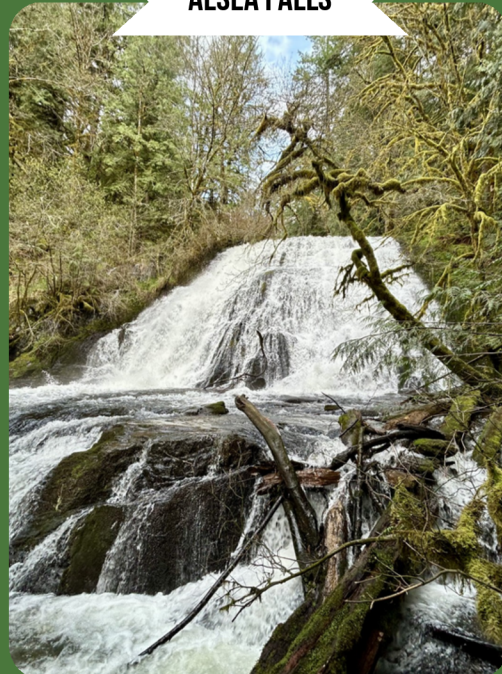

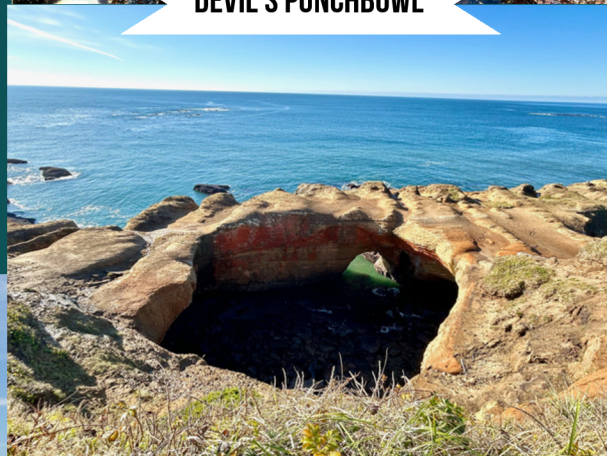
Stop by the historic bay front for coffee and shop at local businesses. Like Corvallis, Newport often hosts festivals such as the annual Seafood & Wine Festival.

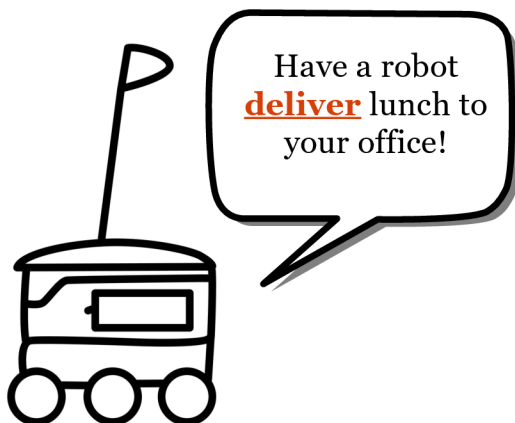

FINDING HOUSING

The majority of our students live off-campus and have roommates. Weniger Hall is on the North end of campus, so many graduate students try and find housing on this side of Corvallis. The Northwest corner is a bit quieter and further away from undergraduates while still being close to OSU, businesses, and grocery stores. However, our students live all over Corvallis and where you live depends partly what you like doing in your free time. If you enjoy going to sporting events or other OSU-hosted activities you might consider living on the East side of campus. If you like hiking or taking trips to the coast, you might prefer the West side. It does not take long to get across town, and the Beaver Bus and Corvallis Bus system run through most parts of town. You may consider living in Philomath, which is right next to Corvallis and where the rent is cheaper. However, there are fewer housing and transportation opportunities here. STUDENT TIPS FOR HOUSING & ROOMMATE SEARCHES

- Find listings on Zillow (great for finding houses to rent if you have a family)
- Use Facebook Marketplace, Facebook Housing Groups, & Graduate Student Groups
 - This can be helpful for finding roommates & furnishing your apartment as well
- Be wary of apartment complexes advertised as student housing - the management does not do as good a job keeping up units and they can be full of loud undergraduates
 - Students recommend staying away from The Domain & The Sierras
- Plan a visit to Corvallis and walk/drive around to find *For Rent* signs
- Start searching early - apartments here get rented out quickly
- Connect with other statistics graduate students to find roommates
- Live near a bus route

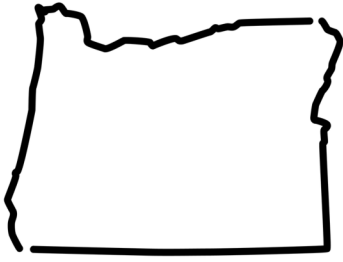

TRAVELING TO OREGON & THE UNITED STATES



The closest airport to Corvallis is the Eugene Airport (EUG), which is ~45 minutes away. Typically, the Eugene airport is a better option for individuals already living in the Western part of the country, as it is a smaller airport with more flight options for the West Coast. You will likely have to rent a car from Eugene, as there are not many shuttles between Eugene and Corvallis.

You may find more flight options (and for a more affordable price) in Portland, OR (PDX), which is about 2 hours away. From Portland, you have some shuttle options, such as **GROOM** or the **FLIX bus**. There is also the **Amtrak** train, which drops you off in Albany, one of our neighboring cities. The FLIX route should also run from Eugene all the way up to Seattle with stops in Corvallis and Portland.



If you are driving from the East, be prepared to drive through some very remote parts of the country. Surrounding states such as Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, and even Eastern Oregon are not as densely populated, and it can be harder to find gas and overnight lodging for multi-day trips. There are also areas with no cell service. Be sure to plan your route and stops ahead of time. Pay attention to your gas tank and do not let it empty much further than ½ a tank in case there are no nearby stations. It would also be a good idea to bring some extra water and snacks in case you have car troubles and have to pull over for help. It is a very beautiful part of the country to drive through, but because so much of the original nature is intact, you need to be a little more careful when road tripping to the PNW.

TRAVEL TIPS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

- Plan to only bring 1-2 large suitcases and a backpack
 - Leave behind bulky items like a winter coat and replace them in Oregon. We have lots of outdoor apparel stores in Oregon, and you probably will not need a super heavy or long winter coat, as our winters are pretty mild.
- Buy tickets through Sky Scanner (at least 4 months in advance)
- Make sure your passport is valid for at least 6 months after your arrival date
- Keep all your important documentation with you for easy access when you fly
